FUSION GROUP NEARS GOAL, SAYS LARSON

The Independent-Fusion Committee of Nassau County is within sight of its first objective, it was announced Monday night by A. W. Larson, spokesman for the Levittown division of the organization. Petitions have been circulated in Levittown and other communities in the county during the past three weeks to secure 1900 signatures required for the addition of a new line to the ballot for the November 5 election.

"When the goal is reached," Larson said, "Levittown signatures will prove to have been a factor of very great importance."

Larson's statement stressed Fusion support for Louis J. Lawrence of 55 Hawk Lane, Democratic candidate for councilman, Town of Hempstead, although Lawrence's name was unavoidably omitted from Independent-Fusion petitions. Others supported their party affiliation, and the offices for which they are nominated follow:

Carl T. Sigman, Democrat, for county executive; Norman Salt, Democrat, for judge of children's court; William A. Seabury, Jr., Republican, for chairman of the board of assessors; Alfonso P. Rubano, Republican, for county controller; Dr. Karl Baehr, Independent, for county clerk; and Douglas F. Young, Independent, for supervisor at large, Town of Hempstead.

Handyman's Fate In Armed Holdup Trial Nears Jury

The fate of Cyril Scott, 23-year-old Inwood handyman charged with a \$4,000 armed holdup at Lawrence in July, is expected to be in the hands of the jury today.

Scott, who lives at 28 Bayview avenue, Inwood, faces charges of robbery, grand larceny and assault in the entering of the home of Mrs. Sadie Seidman at 30 Herriek road, Lawrence on July 7.

It is charged that he pretended to be a delivery man and held Mrs. Seidman at gun point while he and two others who have not yet been caught made off with \$400 cash and \$4,000 worth of jewelry.

In county court, Mineola, Mrs. Seidman has positively identified Scott as the man who told her he was a delivery man but Scott claimed that at the time Mrs. Seidman was robbed, he was seated on the porch of an Inwood home in the company of friends.

The owner of the home and several other witnesses supported his alibi in testimony. The case will go to the jury today after both sides have made their summations.

MINISTER HERE ACCEPTS POST IN NEW JERSEY

The Rev. Owen Presley, pastor of the Olivet Baptist church in Valley Stream, has announced his resignation. His decision was announced to the congregation earlier in the week and released to the press last night.

He has been minister of the church since 1945 when he and his family came to Valley Stream. The Rev. Mr. Presley and Mrs. Presley have two sons, Philip 7, and Mark 3. His resignation will take effect October 16, when he will preach his last sermon.

The minister said last night that he is leaving to become pastor of the Margate Community church at Margate City, N. J., which is just outside Atlantic City. Born in Michigan, the 32-year-old pastor was graduated from Kalamazoo College in Michigan and received his Bachelor of Divinity degree at Crozer Theological seminary, Chester, Pa. He also studied at Union Theological seminary and Columbia University, New York City.

During his ministry in Valley Stream the Rev. Mr. Presley has been an ardent spokesman for cooperative church effort and active in community affairs.

In his statement the pastor declared:

"To say that I will miss all those good people who worked with me and planned with me is certainly an understatement. In a real sense I want to be their good friend, a minister always, but now before me lies the opportunity to extend my ministry."

No successor has been chosen as yet for the Rev. Mr. Presley.
